Any symptoms or conditions not included on this document should be disclosed on the application if relevant to the questions asked on the form.

Disclosures that don't need to be made if it meets the following criteria:

- Diagnosed more than 3 months ago by a medical professional.
- The condition has required no specialist consultations and is managed by your GP or nurse at your GP surgery.
- The condition is **well controlled** or fully resolved with or without treatment.
- No **specialist** appointments are planned or recommended.
- Acid reflux/regurgitation
- Acne
- Advice regarding routine dental or visual maintenance or check-ups
- Allergies
- Asthma
- B12 anaemia/pernicious anaemia
- Benign lump/mole
- Acute blepharitis
- Cholesterol treated with statin only
- Cold/flu
- Conjunctivitis
- COVID-19 provided all symptoms had resolved within 3 months
- Dermatitis
- Acute ear infection
- Eczema
- Acute eye infection
- Acute fungal infection
- Gout (excluding chronic gouty arthritis)
- Grommets
- Haemorrhoids/piles
- Hay fever
- Headaches
- Hiatus hernia
- High blood pressure
- Ingrown toenail

- Inoculations
- Investigation and treatment regarding fertility
- Iron deficiency anaemia provided it has been confirmed to be due to diet or pregnancy only
- Kidney stones provided there has only ever been the one episode
- Acute labyrinthitis provided all symptoms had resolved within 3 months of onset
- Menopause
- Oral contraception
- Osteoporosis/osteopenia
- Pregnancy related conditions
- Psoriasis provided this does not extend to the joints (psoriatic arthritis)
- Raynaud's disease unless you are aware that it is a symptom of another underlying condition

- Routine NHS screenings (including cervical, mammogram and bowel) - provided the results were normal
- Sinusitis
- Tinnitus
- Underactive thyroid
- Acute urinary infection

Disclosures that don't need to be made if it meets the following criteria:

- Treatment has already taken place
- A full recovery has been made
- Is NOT as a result of cancer and
- No specialist appointments are planned or recommended
- Appendicectomy
- Bilateral cataracts provided there has been a full discharge from care
- Gall bladder removal due to gallstones
- Hysterectomy
- Tonsillectomy or adenoidectomy

Disclosures that don't need to be made if it meets the following criteria:

- There has only been a single episode.
- The condition has fully resolved, without symptoms for 6 months or more.
- No **specialist** appointments, investigation or surgery are planned or recommended.
- Accident or sporting injury
- Dislocation
- Fractures Provided there is no residual metalwork, pins or plates.
- Joint sprain/strain/bruising
- Pulled muscle or muscular injury
- Rotator cuff injury
- Tendonitis
- Tennis elbow/golfer's elbow

Definitions

Acute	A disease, illness or injury that has responded quickly to treatment and has fully resolved.
Specialist	A healthcare professional to whom a member is referred by their General Practitioner (primary care physician) for secondary care.
Well controlled	A good response to treatment and symptoms are not increasing in severity or frequency
